

## **Supporting Reading, Oracy, and Literacy Skills**

Area of Literacy	It Will Help if You:
Reading	<ul> <li>Encourage your child to read every day and talk to them about what they are reading.</li> <li>Encourage your child to read out loud to you.</li> <li>If your child is unsure of vocabulary, ensure they look up words in a dictionary and record them.</li> <li>Talk to your child about the purpose of texts and their reading of them.</li> <li>Introduce a range of text types and styles to your child.</li> <li>Discuss topics that will develop your child's reading around a topic.</li> <li>Discuss topics found in our newsletter: word, job, article of the week and book of the month.</li> </ul>
Writing	<ul> <li>Correct your child's grammar in their writing.</li> <li>List new words and check your child's understanding of them.</li> <li>Pronounce, define, and contextualise new words that your child comes across.</li> <li>Support written homework with planning, structuring, drafting, writing, proof-reading, and editing.</li> </ul>
Oracy	<ul> <li>Challenge talk by ensuring answers are in full sentences and are not using slang or fillers.</li> <li>Pick students up on speech trends (e.g. 'basically', 'like', 'he goes' instead of 'he said').</li> <li>Correct your child's grammar in their speaking.</li> <li>Encourage your child to use new words they have learnt and complex vocabulary.</li> <li>Encourage your child to listen carefully, ask questions and take turns to speak in their discussions.</li> <li>Remind your child to speak at an appropriate volume, tone, and pace.</li> <li>Encourage philosophical/hypothetical discussions: e.g. starting with 'what if?'</li> </ul>
Developing a Passion for Reading and Encouraging Reading at Home	<ul> <li>Read with your child and encourage them to read to you as much as possible.</li> <li>Set aside time to read every day - ideally for at least 20 minutes per day; reading before bed is a great time for this.</li> <li>Spend time in the local library.</li> <li>Use the reading questions when you read with your child.</li> <li>Read a book at the same time as your child and discuss it.</li> <li>Let your child see you reading; share the types of texts that you read (e.g. newspaper, biographies, your favourite novel).</li> <li>Encourage your children to share their ideas and opinions by talking about what they are reading and what they have learnt.</li> </ul>
